2. Intellectual Disabilities

1) Law concerned with person with Intellectual Disabilities

Malaysia adhered to the principles of non-discrimination, equal opportunity and full participation with regard to policy and programmes of PWDs (including PWID) in order to protect their rights and dignity through the Person with Disability Act 2008.

2) Financial Assistance for Person with Intellectual Disabilities

Financial assistance scheme are available to ensure that PWID continue to benefit and participate in mainstream society. Types of financial assistance includes disabled worker allowance, special aid to the caregivers of the disabled and chronically ill and special aid to the disabled who are unable to work.

Services including CBR available for persons with Intellectual Disabilities

Department of Social Welfare Malaysia(DSWM) is the main government agency responsible for the development and well being of PWID. Several services provided are as follows:

a) Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) Programme

CBR programme was introduced in 1984 as a strategy within the community for the rehabilitation, equalisation of opportunities and social integration of all PWID. It also facilitate PWID for their full and equal participation in rehabilitation and training, which enable them to acquire social development and practical skills. CBR has achieved tremendous progress in terms of expansion and program development. Rehabilitation and learning programmes provided in the CBR centres encompases physical and occupational therapy, skills in daily living and social interaction.

b) Care, protection and rehabilitation

There are 7 institutions known as Taman Sinar Harapan for the care and rehabilitation of PWID. This institutions provide care, rehabilitation and training so as to improve the quality and standard of living of PWID and to enable them to live a more independent life.

c) Job Opportunity

Job placement is provided in sheltered workshop to create job opportunities, increase capabilities, potential, knowledge and skills. DSWM also has inititiated job coaching proggramme with the cooperation of Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA).

d) Financial Assistance

Financial assistance scheme are available to ensure that PWID continue to benefit and participate in mainstream society.

e) Early Intervention Programmes

Ministry of Health has initiate early intervention programmes for children with learning problem in the rural and urban areas with the active involvement of their families.

3. **Outline of your Organization:**

> > The Department of Social Welfare Malaysia (DSWM) was established in

1946. Within a period of 66 years, DSWM has evolved in fulfilling its role in

national development. From its involvement in handling various problems,

the Department's role and functions have expanded to cover prevention and

rehabilitation services on social issues and community development. DSWM

(2) Major Program, covered area, covered population, number of benefeciaries

Major Programs: DSWM performs programmes based on the objective such as provide care, protection and rehabilitation to the target groups, develop a community through attitudinal change and capacity, create a caring society and enhance community well-being through professional social welfare services. The programmes generally divided into protection, rehabilitation, prevention, development and integration.

Covered Areas: DSWM covers the whole country, from national level, state and district.

Covered population includes children, person with disabilities (PWDs), older persons, destitute person, familiy(woman & girl, single parent, victims of domestic violence, the poor & people with problems), victim of natural bisaster and voluntary organizations.

Number of PWID benefeciaries

There are 359,203 PWDs registered with the DSWM which 130,013 is PWID get the benefit from services provided.

(3) Your position and duty

I am Senior Assistance Director in Department for the Development Of People With Disabilities. My duty is to administrate, plan and implement the program/activities to ensure the well-being of the PWD (includes person with intellectual disability).

4. Community Development program which include Intellectual Disability issue as on of the activities. (If u know any)

DSWM has set up CBR programme as a strategy within the community for the rehabilitation, equalisation of opportunities and social integration of all PWID. It is a one-stop centre that provides services such as diagnosis, rehabilitation, treatment and special education. It also provides vocational training to prepare the PWDs for employment. CBR is implemented through the combined efforts of persons and children with disabilities themselves, their families and communities, together with the appropriate health, education, vocational and social services. It aims to reduce the impact of disability and provide the support services for families of persons and children with disabilities. The CBR programme is a preferred alternative to institutional care since it provides decentralised rehabilitation services and early intervention for persons and children with disabilities in their own community. It helps to ensure the acceptance and social integration of PWDs, including children, as well as providing them the opportunity to develop their abilities and skills to their full potential, leading to a meaningful live.

5. Situation of PWID in your country/area

(1) Diagnosis (professional responsible for diagnosis)

Medical Officers are responsible to diagnoses PWID. After the confirmation, they can be registered with DSWM and identity card will be issued for easy access to services.

(2) Education (Special Education and Integrated Education)

Educatioan in Malaysia is overseen by Ministry of Education. PWID is educated within integrated programmes as no special education schools were established for children with learning disabilities. The decision to include these students rest entirely on the school's administrative prerogative based on advice by the school's special education teachers. There are two generally accepted criteria for inclusion of children with learning disabilities: i)they are able to manage themselves without help; and ii) they do not have behavioral – conditions that could caused disruption to mainstream learning.

(3) Vocational Training and Job Opportunity

DSWM operates Taman Sinar Harapan, Industrial and Rehabilitation Training Centre and Sheltered Workshops which provide care, rehabilitation and vocational training for PWDs. Job opportunity is provided to help PWDs who are unable or not ready to compete in an open labour market.

(4) Support Organizatioons

a) Governmental agencies

The National Council for PWDs was established to oversee, coordinate and monitor the implementation of National Policy and

Plan of Action relating to PWDs. The members of the council include government agency and PWDs.

b) Number of NGOs concerned with Person with Intellectual Disabilities

There are 50 NGOs actively involved in providing services to persons with disabilities in the areas of welfare, care, education, training and rehabilitation of persons with disabilities. (**refer Appendix V**)

6. Based on the information above, what are the issues to solve to conduct effective support for person with intellectual disabilities?

DSWM is committed to improve th equality of live of PWDs and to ensure that PWDs contribute, enjoy and benefit in the country's development. Due to lack of accommodation in employment and education, its contribute to PWID live in poverty and socially isolated. Society's attitudes such as prejudice, beliefs, ignorance etc create obstacle to inclusion. There is often failure to recognize the contribution of PWID and tendency to see only disability rather that the person.

Initiative should be taken in order to conduct effective support for PWID such as changing the minset and perception of PWID at all level, from policy makers and implementer to the general public including the PWID themselves, enhance capacity building to ensure adequate and competent workforce at all level, empower individual, families and communities with edequate knowledge and skills on disability and strengthen intersectoral collaboration with stakeholders through networking and smart partnerships.
